About Us

International NGO Forum on Indonesian Development (INFID) is a non-governmental organization founded in 1985 under the name INGI (Inter-NGO Conference on IGGI Matters). INFID was established at the initiative of several prominent figures such as Gus Dur, Asmara Nababan, Gaffar Rahman, Adnan Buyung Nasution, Dawam Rahardjo, Fauzi Abdullah, Wukirsari, Kartjono, and Zoemrotin KS, as well as civil society organizations in Indonesia and their partners in the Netherlands, and many others, for conducting policy advocacy efforts at the international and national level on development issues and democratization in Indonesia.

In 2004, INFID gained consultative status with the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) of the United Nations. INFID currently focuses on three areas: Reducing Inequality, Implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), and Human Rights and Democracy. Together with 86 members dispersed across Indonesia, INFID initiates policy studies, monitoring and advocacy.

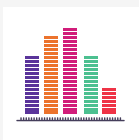
Vision

Reducing Inequality

INFID's Program on Reducing Inequality designed to answer the challenges of equitable development in Indonesia, including:

- (1) How to ensure the reduction of inequality become a development indicator.
- (2) How to make the Indonesian tax and social spending system (tax and transfer) effective in reducing inequality.
- (3) How to ensure that the programs of the central government and regional governments expand access and quality of education, health and employment services, including the elimination of various discriminatory practices (against disabled groups, women, indigenous peoples, elderly, and other marginalized groups).

Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)

Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) 2030 was adopted as global agenda by 193 countries in September, 25, 2015 at the UN Headquarters, New York. The SDGs contain 17 goals and 169 targets and must be achieved in 2030. Indonesia has committed to implement SDGs. INFID has made several efforts to encourage the implementation and achievement of SDGs in Indonesia by:

- (1) Encouraging the governance of SDGs that can provide opportunities for all parties to be involved in the implementation of SDGs.
- (2) Encourage the involvement of civil society in the implementation and achievement of SDGs in various regions.
- (3) Involving universities to be actively involved in the implementation and achievement of SDGs.

INFID played an important role in encouraging the issuance of Presidential Regulation (Perpres) No. 59 of 2017 about the Implementation of Achieving Sustainable Development Goals. Since 2017, INFID has encouraged 7 regions, namely Bojonegoro, Pangkajene Kepulauan (Pangkep), Malang, Kubu Raya, Banda Aceh, Jember, Cirebon, Maros, Kupang, and DI Yogyakarta Province to adopt SDGs accompanied by inclusive and participatory governance.

HAM dan Demokrasi

Human Rights and Democracy Program INFID is aimed at monitoring the reform process in Indonesia to guarantee that it takes place in a democratic manner, and applies the principles of human rights. The program focuses on:

- (1) Promoting human rights cities.
- (2) Implementing the principles for business and human rights.
- (3) Preventing intolerance and extremism.
- (4) Creating an enabling environment for civil society while consolidating civil society in responding to developments in electoral politics.

INFID in the last 4 years has actively conducted studies and research, fostered partnerships with various stakeholders, launched public campaigns and education through offline and online media platforms in different cities across Indonesia, and initiated policy advocacy efforts on to promote human rights and democracy at the national and sub-national level.
